


US 2017 Billion Dollar Weather/Climate Disasters





Resist and Reclaim Fund

- Launched November 9, 2016
- Increase support to women and transgender human rights defenders in the United States
- 28 organizations/activists
- 96% women of color and trans-led
- 300% increase in security/safety requests
 - Digital security infrastructure, legal defense, evacuation, office security





Grant Examples

- Black-led LGBTQGNC org. to host education clinics focusing on a pending trans-phobic legislation regarding sex discrimination.
- Intersex youth advocates to testify in favor of a bill in the state senate that would protect the human rights of intersex children.
- Undocumented trans women activist who has been detained in an all-male immigration detention center.
- Relocation & security planning for a non-binary
 Transgender Latina activist theologian and ethicist.


